Population: The United Arab Emirates is home to a diverse population of over nine million people. The majority of residents are expatriates drawn to the country for employment opportunities and business. Emiratis make up a smaller portion of the population. The dynamic demographic mix contributes to the country's cosmopolitan nature, with people from various nationalities and backgrounds coexisting

harmoniously.

Cuisine: Emirati cuisine is influenced by the traditions of the Arabian Peninsula and South Asia. Dishes often feature ingredients like lamb, rice, fish, and aromatic spices. Iconic Emirati dishes include Biryani, Al Harees, and Machboos. Dates and Arabic coffee are traditional staples of hospitality. The UAE also offers an array of international cuisines, thanks to its diverse expatriate population.

Religion: Islam is the predominant religion in the UAE, with the majority of the population adhering to Sunni Islam. Language: Arabic is the official language of the UAE, and it is widely spoken and understood. However, English is also widely used, especially in business, education, and as a lingua franca among the multicultural population. The country's linguistic diversity extends to the presence of numerous other languages spoken by expatriate communities.

Climate: The UAE has a desert climate characterised by hot and sunny weather. Summers are scorching, with temperatures often exceeding 40°C (104°F). Winters are milder, with daytime temperatures ranging from 18°C to 28°C (64°F to 82°F). Rainfall is scarce, and the country experiences high levels of sunshine yearround. Coastal areas benefit from a more moderate climate due to the cooling influence of the Arabian Gulf. The desert climate is ideal for outdoor activities such as dune bashing, camel riding, and enjoying the pristine beaches.





EDUCATION

Higher Education in the United Arab Emirates has witnessed remarkable growth and development over the past few decades. The country is home to several world-class universities and institutions that offer a wide range of academic programmes. Many of these institutions have established themselves as global centres of excellence, attracting students and faculty from around the world. The UAE's higher education system places a strong emphasis on research, innovation, and international collaborations, making it an attractive destination for students seeking quality education and a multicultural learning environment.

ACCOMMODATION AND FINANCIALS


VISA, WORK RIGHTS AND IMMIGRATION

Study Visa: Obtaining a study visa is a crucial step for international students planning to pursue higher education in the UAE. To secure a study visa, students typically need to be accepted by a recognised institution in the UAE and provide necessary documents, such as an acceptance letter, a valid passport, and proof of financial means. The application process may vary slightly depending on the emirate and institution, but once granted, the study visa allows students to reside in the UAE for the duration of their academic programme.

Work Rights: International students in the UAE often can work part-time during their studies, typically up to 20 hours per week. This part-time employment can help students gain practical experience and supplement their finances. During semester breaks, students may be allowed to work full-time. Job opportunities are available both on and off campus, and students often find employment in areas such as Retail, Hospitality, and Administrative roles. The specific work regulations may vary depending on the emirate and the institution, so students should ensure they understand the terms and conditions of their visa.

Post-Study Visa: The UAE offers post-study work opportunities for international graduates who wish to stay and work in the country after completing their education. The specific rules and eligibility criteria may vary between emirates, but in many cases, graduates have a window of time, typically a year, to secure employment and transition to a work visa. This allows recent graduates to gain work experience and potentially explore long-term career prospects in

the UAE, a feature that appeals to many international students seeking to launch their professional careers in the region. Students should stay updated on the latest regulations regarding post-study work visas in the UAE.





PATHWAYS TO PERMANENT RESIDENCY

Investor Visa: The UAE offers various investor visas for individuals who make substantial financial investments in the country, such as through property purchases, establishing a business, or contributing to certain government-sponsored initiatives. Meeting the required investment threshold can lead to permanent residency.

Retirement Visa: The UAE has introduced retirement visas for expatriates aged 55 and above. To be eligible, applicants must meet certain financial criteria and health requirements.

Long-Term Visa: The UAE's long-term visa, also known

as the "Golden Visa," offers residency to investors, entrepreneurs, skilled professionals, and exceptional talents in various fields. This visa grants a ten-year residency and may be renewable.







PATHWAY TO CITIZENSHIP

Exceptional Contributions: UAE citizenship may be granted to individuals who have made significant contributions to the country, such as excelling in sports, culture, or academics. This pathway is typically at the discretion of UAE authorities.

Marriage to a UAE Citizen: Foreign spouses married to UAE citizens can apply for UAE citizenship after a certain period of marriage and residency in the country.

Children of UAE Citizens: Children born to Emirati citizens are eligible for UAE citizenship. The specifics may vary depending on the nationality of the parents.

Residency-Based Naturalisation: Foreign nationals who have legally resided in the UAE for a specified number of years and meet certain criteria may be eligible for UAE citizenship through naturalisation.
