- Australia
- Andorra
- Brazil
- Canada
- El Salvador
- Honduras
- Israel
- Japan
- Monaco
- New Zealand
- San Marino
- Switzerland
- United States

South Korea

If your country of residence isn't on the list, don't fret – we're here to provide you with all the vital details in this article.



For residents of the mentioned countries, a crucial step is to register with the local Residents' Registration Office within two weeks of arriving in Germany. Additionally, for residents of Andorra, Brazil, El Salvador, Honduras, Monaco, and San Marino, a visa is required if you plan to work during your studies or after graduation. Your journey to studying in Germany starts here, and we've got you covered every step of the way.”



TYPES OF GERMAN STUDENT VISAS

In the quest for German education excellence, selecting the right visa is crucial. Germany offers a variety of visa options based on the purpose and duration of your stay. If your intent is educational and long-term, the Short-term/Schengen visa (C Visa) won't be your pathway. Instead, the Germany National Visa (D Visa) is your ticket to long-term learning. Your educational journey in Germany is unique, and so are your visa options !!

Within the realm of German Student visas, consider the following options tailored to the specifics of your study programme:

Language Course Visa: Ideal for German language courses ranging from 3 months to 1 year.

Student Applicant Visa: Designed for those awaiting formal admission letters or preparing for university entrance exams. This visa has a 3-month validity, extendable up to 6 months.

Student Visa: Your long-term solution once you've secured admission to a German university. Remember to promptly register with the Alien Registration Office in your German city of residence within two weeks of arrival to facilitate your Residence Permit.

DOCUMENTS REQUIRED FOR APPLYING FOR SUBCLASS 500 VISA

Your pursuit of a German student visa hinges on meeting these crucial requirements:

Visa Application Documents:

- Duly completed and signed national visa application form.
- Valid national passport.
- Two photocopies of your passport.
- Birth certificate.
- Marriage certificate (if applicable).
- Child's birth certificate (if applicable).
- Up to 3 recent passport-style photographs, obtainable conveniently from MyBiometricPhotos.com.
- Photocopies of previous German residence titles (if applicable).

Proof of Financial Resources

“Finanzierungsnachweis” (Choose one):

- Confirmation of an €11,208 deposit in a German blocked bank account.
- Letter of commitment and evidence of your parent's income and financial assets.
- Letter of commitment by a German resident, obtained from the Alien's Registration Office, pledging to cover your study costs.
- Scholarship awarding certificate specifying the covered costs.



- Bank guarantee from a recognised German bank.

Proof of University Admission:

- Confirmation of admission to your chosen studies, “Zulassungsbescheid,” issued by a recognised higher education provider in Germany, indicating your programme start date and the language of instruction.
- For conditional admission, you must provide a “Bedingter Zulassungsbescheid” and confirmation of participation in an intensive language course lasting more than 6 months, with at least 18 hours of weekly lessons.
- If you are conditionally admitted to a university preparatory course, include the relevant documentation.

Evidence of Previous Education:

- Original school-leaving certificate.
- Degree certificate (if entering Master’s or PhD studies).

Student health insurance.

Health Insurance for Travel (Covering the Period from Departure to University Enrolment - Approximately 3 Months)

- For students aged 29 and below, you can enjoy complimentary travel health insurance for up to 31 days through German Student Insurance, effective from March 5, 2020.



- If you're 30 years or older, a language student, an intern, or a doctoral student, consider enrolling in EDUCARE24 by DR-WALTER. This health insurance offering combines affordability and quality, and it holds recognition from German Embassies and Consulates worldwide

Curriculum Vitae (CV)

Statement of Purpose: Elaborate on your selection of this degree programme and outline your aspirations for the future.

University Entrance Qualification.

Certificate of German or English Language Proficiency.

Meeting these requirements is your passport to a vibrant educational journey in Germany.

- German Language Proficiency Certificate- Minimum B1 level
- IELTS- An overall band score of 6 with no band below 5.5
- TOFEL- An overall score of 550 (Paper based), 213 (computer-based) and 79-80 (internet-based).



PROCEDURE FOR APPLYING FOR A GERMAN STUDENT VISA

Step 1: Obtain APS Certificates

Submission of APS certificates will be a compulsory requirement for your visa application. To apply for and secure an APS certificate required for a German student visa, follow these steps:

Understand the Application Process: Begin by acquainting yourself with the application process and prerequisites. You can access this information on the Academic Evaluation Centre (APS) on India's official website.

Collect Essential Documents: The documents you need will depend on your education level and chosen course of study. Nevertheless, standard documents usually include:

- Copies of academic certificates and transcripts.
- A copy of your passport.
- A copy of your acceptance letter from a German university or college.
- A copy of your health insurance certificate.
- A copy of your proof of financial resources.



Complete Online Registration: Register for an APS certificate through the APS India website.

Pay Processing Fee: The fee for processing an APS certificate is 200 euros.

Submit Application: Send the printed application forms along with attested copies of the original documents. You can either submit your application in person at the APS India office in New Delhi or send it by mail.

Document Review and Interview: Once your application is submitted, the APS will assess your documents and determine your eligibility for an APS certificate. If deemed eligible, you will be invited for an interview. During the interview, you will be asked questions about your educational background, study plans, and knowledge of the German education system.

Certificate Issuance: Successful completion of the interview results in the issuance of your APS certificate, typically within 4-6 weeks of the interview.

Step 2: Find Your Nearest German Embassy or Consulate

Start by using online resources, such as Google, to locate the nearest German embassy or consulate in your country or a nearby nation. Their official websites provide valuable information, including requirements and instructions for scheduling a visa appointment.

Step 3: Review Requirements and Procedures

Visit the student visa section of the German embassy's



website to carefully review the specific requirements for your country and the steps for setting up a visa appointment. Thoroughly familiarise yourself with the documents you'll need before scheduling your appointment.

Step 4: Set Up Your Visa Appointment

Once you're well-prepared, follow the guidelines on the official German embassy website in your country to schedule your visa appointment. In some regions, it's advisable to apply for an appointment several weeks in advance, as embassies can experience high volumes of visa applications.

Step 5: Prepare Your Visa Application Documents

After confirming your appointment, double-check all your documents to ensure you have everything in order. You can handle this process independently and won't need to engage external consultants or agencies.

Step 6: Get Ready for Your Visa Interview

Before your visa interview, you'll be required to pay the application fee of €75.00 and have the payment confirmation on hand.

Note:

This fee is non-refundable, even if your visa application is declined.



Be sure to verify the exchange rate for your country's currency to pay the exact amount.

Adequately prepare for your interview, and be ready to answer common student visa interview questions.

Following the interview, you'll receive an official response regarding the approval or rejection of your visa application.

The duration for processing a German student visa typically spans around 25 days, although this timeline may vary based on factors like the specific German Embassy and the country from which you are applying. In certain situations, the processing period can extend to 6-12 weeks, with the maximum processing time reaching up to 3 months.



OBTAINING A STUDENT RESIDENCE PERMIT IN GERMANY

Here's a step-by-step guide to settling in Germany as an international student:

Secure Permanent Housing: Within your first week in Germany with a study visa, you must secure permanent accommodation.

Register at the Resident's Office: Without delay, you must register your address at the local Resident's Office. Upon registration, you'll receive a confirmation document known as 'Meldebescheinigung.'

- Required registration documents include:
- A valid national passport or national ID card, demonstrating a valid visa if you're from a visa-regime country.
- Rental contract.
- Confirmation letter of your residence, issued by your landlord.

Enrol in Your Studies: Officially enrolling at the university is vital to access your courses and university resources. This process, known as matriculation, involves submitting various documents to the university's 'Studentensekretariat' (student affairs office) and paying the semester fee to receive your student ID and card.

Required enrolment documents include:

- National Passport/national ID Card, showing a valid study visa for visa-regime citizens.
- Confirmation of admission to your chosen



programme.

- German University Entrance Qualification or an equivalent qualification allowing you to begin university studies in Germany.
- Recent passport-sized photographs.
- Student Health Insurance.

Note: The international office, 'Akademisches Auslandsamt,' at your university is your primary source of information regarding academic and residence requirements.

Apply for a Residence Permit for Studies: Once you're registered for your studies, you'll need to extend your visa by applying for a residence permit for studies at the local Foreigner's Authority, 'Einwohnermeldeamt.'

Required residence permit application documents include:

Completed application form for a residence permit ('Antrag auf Erteilung eines Aufenthaltstitels').

National passport/national ID card, demonstrating a valid entry visa if you initially entered with a visa.

Documents confirming your permanent address in Germany.

Confirmation of registration.

Rental contract.

A letter from your landlord verifying your permanent address.



Recent passport-style photographs.

Proof of financial subsistence (same evidence provided during your visa application).

Proof of admission to your studies (e.g., certificate of enrolment, confirmation of admission, or evidence of conditional admission).

*****Application fee (56-100 euros for first-time applicants, 49-96 euros for permit extensions, 28.8 euros for Turkish students).***

Yes, you can work part-time during the semester and full-time during holidays. There are restrictions on the number of hours you can work.

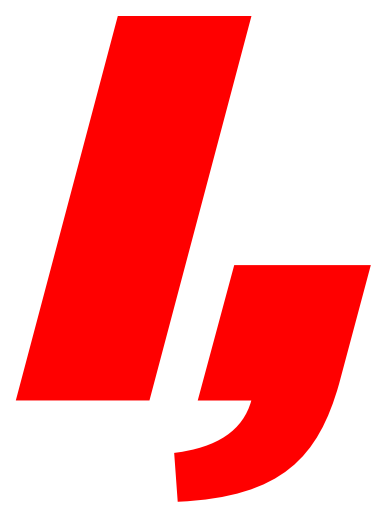
Is it possible to travel within the Schengen area with a German student visa?
