ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

To be eligible for a student visa to the UK, you must meet the following requirements:

- You must have been accepted into a full-time course of study at a recognised UK education institution.
- You must have sufficient funds to support yourself and any dependants during your studies in the UK. You must have sufficient funds to cover your course fees for one academic year, which is typically up to 9 months. The specific amount required will be indicated on your Confirmation of Acceptance for Studies (CAS). For courses in London, this translates to £1,334 per month for a maximum of 9 months, while for courses outside London, the requirement is £1,023 per month for the same duration.
- You must be able to speak, read, write, and understand English to a level that is sufficient for your studies.
- You must meet the UK's immigration health requirements.



SCOPE OF COVERAGE

A student visa to the UK allows you to:

- Study at a recognised UK education institution
- Live in the UK for the duration of your studies
- Work part-time (up to 20 hours per week during term time)
- Bring your family with you (dependant visa)

TYPES OF STUDENT VISAS

There are two main types of student visa to the UK:

Tier 4 (General) Student Visa: This visa is for students who are coming to the UK to study for a full-time course of study at a recognised UK education institution.

Tier 4 (Child) Student Visa: This visa is for children under the age of 18 who are coming to the UK to study at a recognised UK education institution.



DOCUMENTS REQUIRED

The documents required to apply for a student visa to the UK vary depending on your nationality and the type of visa you are applying for. However, some common documents include:

- A valid passport
- A completed visa application form
- A CAS (Certificate of Acceptance for Studies) statement from your UK education institution
- Proof of financial support
- An ATAS certificate is necessary if both your course and nationality make it a requirement.
- If you're under the age of 18, you must provide evidence of consent from your parent or legal guardian.
- Proof of English language proficiency
- A tuberculosis test certificate (if required)

Language Proficiency Requirements

- IELTS- An overall band score of 6 with no band below 5.5 in each section
- TOFEL iBT- A minimum score of 70



APPLICATION PROCEDURE

To apply for a student visa to the UK, you can follow these steps:

- Visit the UK Visas and Immigration (UKVI) website and create an account.
- Complete the online visa application form.
- Pay the visa application fee. The application fee for a Student visa when applying from outside the UK is £490.
- Book an appointment at a visa application centre. You are required to provide your biometric information, including fingerprints and a photograph, at the visa application centre.
- Attend your appointment and submit your visa application and supporting documents.



VALIDITY

The duration of your stay in the UK is determined by factors such as the length of your course and your prior study history in the UK.

If you're 18 years or older and your course is at a degree level, you typically have the option to remain in the UK for a maximum of 5 years. For courses below degree level, the standard duration is typically up to 2 years. To ascertain the precise duration of your stay, it's advisable to refer to the provided guidance.

If you intend to prolong your stay in the UK, there are several possibilities:

- You may extend your visa if you meet the eligibility criteria, allowing you to continue your studies in the UK.
- If you are already in the UK under a different visa category, you may switch to a Student visa.
- After completing your course, you may opt to switch to a Graduate visa, permitting you to remain in the UK for at least 2 additional years.



FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

What is a UK Student Visa, and who needs one?

A UK Student Visa, also known as a Tier 4 (General) Visa, is required for non-European students planning to study in the UK for longer than 6 months.

How do I apply for a UK Student Visa?
